### The job market in York and North Yorkshire

Farming is at the heart of the region's economy with strong food and tourism sectors. York, Skipton and Harrogate tend to have a more business and commercial focus with larger employers, whilst Selby has a concentration of manufacturing and energy. The coast is dominated by the visitor economy, with a growing engineering industry and major mining and offshore developments.

### There is major growth planned in York and North Yorkshire

- The largest offshore wind farm in the world, with £40 billion investment creating 2,000 jobs.
- £2 billion investment in the potash mine near Whitby, creating 2,500 direct and indirect iobs.
- The National Agri-Food Innovation Campus at Sand Hutton, near York, aims to double in size by 2021 with 1600 people employed on site.
- York is one of the fastest growing cities in the country, with major construction projects planned for the city centre and 22,000 homes to be built in the next 15 years potentially creating 1,000 jobs per year.
- Beyond Escapes, a luxury holiday company, is investing £4m to open a flagship site in Pickering, North Yorkshire creating 250 jobs.
- Work has begun on Sherburn2 a 75 acre business park of logistics and warehousing units, creating up to 2,550 new jobs.

This sector is becoming increasingly science and technology-driven with York and North Yorkshire being a global leader for agri-tech. Agri-tech brings together farmers and growers with scientists and technologists to use new technologies to improve and expand food production. There are a vast range of job roles from very practical and hands on jobs like shepherding to management, agricultural science, agricultural engineering, administration and finance.

- Farming is becoming a hightech business, with drones able to identify pests and diseases affecting crops and GPS able to control combine harvesters.
- Agriculture employs over 5% of all employees compared to less than 2% for Great Britain.

Business services includes administrative services, contact centres. human resources provision, management consultancy, sales, recruitment and training. There are employment opportunities in a wide range of occupational areas.

Construction is about building roads, railways and bridges, as well as houses, schools, shopping centres and hospitals. There are over 150 professions which can involve anything from planning, design, financing, project management or safety through to trades such as bricklaving and joinery. New roles involving green technology, use of new materials and environmental specialisms are emerging.

- Construction is the fastest growing sector in the area with 19,500 people employed in construction.
- Major projects like the potash development near Whitby and offshore windfarms on the coast will need 'an army' of skilled workers
- York is said to be the second. fastest growing city in the country, with a major regeneration in the city centre and 22,000 homes in the next 15 years potentially creating 1,000 jobs per year.

In the future... There is increasing demand for 'sustainable' construction skills and use of new technologies and materials, so new roles will emerge in the sector.

This sector is about generating and developing ideas and products, experiences or events. This includes interactive media, printing, publishing, design and advertising. Many jobs involve working with cutting edge technologies which are driving this sector. Roles include computer games design and animation, film and TV, social media, graphic design, interactive media, print, publishing and advertising.

- Screen Yorkshire has a largescale film and TV studio, at Church Fenton, now home to ITV's Victoria.
- York is the UK's first UNESCO City of Media Arts. This will attract new businesses and provide employment opportunities.
- Skipton has a sizable publishing industry - most are small companies employing less than 25

### **Energy and Bio renewables**

### Drax in Selby is the UK's largest power station

The energy industry is changing with newer renewable energy sources, such as biomass, wind, solar and tidal, rapidly expanding and waste recovery is an increasingly important aspect of the industry. Closely linked is the bio renewables industry which converts animal, plant or crops into energy to power machinery, vehicles or homes or to create oils, fats, cosmetics and detergents. This sector is a very broad industry with job roles in the sciences, engineering, transport, production and management.

- 3,850 jobs in energy and utilities
- The Leeming Biogas facility, one of the largest anaerobic digestion plants in the country, feeds gas into the national grid, by breaking down food waste and capturing the natural biomethane it releases
  - The world's biggest offshore windfarm will be built off the Yorkshire coast at Dogger Bank generating over half the UK's offshore power.

 The region is an international hub for the bio-economy, focussing on the research, development and commercialisation of biobased products and processes.

#### In the future...

By 2020 it is predicted that the renewable energy sector will create many new jobs in Yorkshire and the Humber, with offshore wind creating 11,500 jobs, onshore wind creating 750 jobs, and wave and tidal power creating 250 jobs.



# **Food Manufacturing**

**14,750** jobs in food and drink manufacturing

This involves preparation, production and packing food. It is not just operating machinery, there are roles creating recipes or tasting. roles in engineering, quality control and safety, through to senior management. Companies can specialise in anything from dairy, meat and poultry to bakery goods, fruit and vegetable processing to convenience foods or confectionery.

 Businesses range from small specialist artisan food manufacturers of chocolate. cheese or luxury ice-cream to large multi-nationals like Nestle who manufacture Kit Kat.

 The sector is a hands on sector, but increasingly manufacturers will rely on engineers and technical skills to keep a factory working rather than low skilled

 Malton is developing a Food Enterprise Zone with an agrifood park to encourage small businesses to start up. Eventually this park will employ 500 people.

### Health and Social Care

The largest sector in York and North **Yorkshire** employing 52,000 One of the UK's fastest growing areas. Health and Social Care involves supporting people to live well and independently. This includes jobs working in GP surgeries, hospitals and in the community, supporting people who are sick or injured, with disabilities, mental health problems, young and elderly. Job roles range from health care assistant and nurse to paramedic to doctor, dentist, care worker, care manager, social worker, social services manager and many, many more.

- The National Health Service is the biggest employer in the UK.
- There are over 350 different NHS. careers, from radiographers and doctors to specialist nurses, caterers and accountants
- Nursing is the second most advertised vacancy and care assistants the sixth.
- Between 2014 and 2024 over a third of the health sector workforce will retire so there will be many opportunities.

 The aging population in York and North Yorkshire will create many job opportunities in health and social care of the elderly.

Good people skills are essential for the majority of jobs as most roles involve dealing with customers on a daily basis.

- More British holidaymakers visit the North Yorkshire coast than any other part of the country outside London
- The hospitality industry employs over 10% of all workers in York and North Yorkshire
- The sector is predominately made up of small businesses.



#### In the future...

Demand for graduates is expected to grow, with 69,000 more managers required over the next few years and there will be a need to recruit an additional 11.00 chefs by 2022. The forecast is 26,000 vacancies in hospitality

# SKILLS IN DEMAND:

The IT industry involves working with computers and information systems, including computer applications, software and hardware. There are jobs in design, development, manufacture, customer service, sales and installation. Telecoms is the technology that transmits information such as phone lines, TV, mobile phones, broadband and satellites. Jobs involve installing, testing, repairing, customer service and sales.

- IT occupations most in demand in York and North Yorkshire: software professionals, web developers and computer support specialists.
- The industry will need to recruit 5,000 employees between 2014-2024 in York, North Yorkshire and the East Riding, mainly professionals, managers and technicians
- Yorkshire and the Humber employs 76,000 in IT occupations in a wide range of industries.

BT is the largest employer in this
sector in Yorkshire and the Humber,
employing 1 in 6.

 Emerging technologies such as cloud computing, green IT, social and mobile computing and applications, big data/analytics, smart computing, and security and data protection will affect future skills needs.

#### In the future...

Yorkshire and the Humber is forecast to have the second biggest job growth after London. The largest gains will be in tech services – IT consultancy and data, sales/distribution, and the games industry.

# Transport, Warehousing and Logistics

There are expected to be

vacancies up to 2024 This sector is about moving, handling and storing goods including passenger transport. It includes air freight, rail, shipping, road haulage, freight forwarding, postal services, couriering and wholesaling. Efficient distribution and storage is vital to York and North Yorkshire's many food producers, manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers.

- 10% of national employment in the rail industry is based in York, which is a hub for operations, signalling and head office functions for both rail operators and rail suppliers.
- The development of HS2. Harrogate Line and East Coast Mainline improvements as well as the modernisation of York Railway Station and the National Railway Museum, should also increase opportunities.
- In York and North Yorkshire. transport and storage employs 17,000 and wholesaling a further 17,000 people.
- IT and other technology systems are increasingly important both in warehouse and planning and organising the complex movement of goods and materials from suppliers and manufacturers through to customers.


# INTERNATIONAL VERTICAL FARMING

### Qualifications and routes

Thinking about what qualifications are needed for different jobs is an essential part of careers research. Remember, you can reach your career goals by different routes depending on your career choice.

Qualifications are grouped together according to their difficulty and they are given a level from entry level to level 8

Qualifications at the same level can vary in terms of content, ways of learning and the length of time they take to complete.

### **Changes in qualifications**

**GCSEs:** with numbered grades started in 2017. Grade 9 is the highest and grade 1 is the lowest. Grades 4-5 are roughly equivalent to a grade C in the old system.

T levels (Technical levels): will be phased in between 2020 and 2022. They will be an alternative Level 3, post-16 pathway, with 15 technical routes covering areas such as construction, education and childcare, and engineering.

# Get ready for the future

It starts with a serious think about different careers then researching or gaining experience to find out more. Try:

**Work experience**: Work experience in school time or holidays helps to figure out what to do for a career.

A part-time job: Another way of gaining experience in the world of business. For example a job in a coffee shop can teach about business and customer service.

Join clubs, sports teams, groups: Good for building valuable skills such as communication and teamwork.

### Start a club, group or society:

Publicising a new club, recruiting new members and keeping them turning up is very useful experience and similar to many business situations. **Get networking**: Start building a network of contacts for advice and job opportunities. Talking to people about their jobs is a good place to start.

**Learn how to code or start a blog**: Digital skills are much sought after by employers.

**Travel**: Being confident about travelling and using transport can be useful when it comes to looking at study and work options.
